Key Children Privacy Related Phenomena in the Digital Era

Importance of cultivating data privacy awareness of children



Sharenting

 80% of Hong Kong parents had shared details of their children's lives on social media

Cyberbullying/Doxxing

• 1 in 5 teenagers in Hong Kong experienced cyberbullying

e-Learning

After the outbreak of COVID-19:

- Frequency of use: almost doubled
- Average hours of use per day: +150%

Use of Generative Al

• Nearly 80% of youngsters have used generative AI tools



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Key Privacy Issues Related to Children



Excessive / Unfair Collection	 Privacy policy statements / personal information collection statements are often lengthy and difficult for children to understand Children may not be capable of giving informed consent or making an informed decision to provide their personal data
Over-sharing	 Children may not know how to manage the privacy settings of online platforms / social media networks, thus over-sharing personal data: Prone to doxxing and cyberbullying May encompass long-term consequences



Guidance for Schools on the Collection and Use of Personal Data of Teachers, Staff and Students during COVID-19 Pandemic (Sep 2020)



Guidance for Schools on the Collection and Use of Personal Data of Teachers, Staff and Students during COVID-19 Pandemic

Introduction

Although the COVID-19 epidemic in Hong Kong has abated, it is not totally under control yet. As kindergartens, primary and secondary schools will resume classes in phases from 23 September 2020, it is necessary for schools to implement appropriate epidemic prevention measures, which may involve the collection of personal data of teachers, staff and students, including the more sensitive health data. In this regard, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) reminds schools to strike a reasonable balance between safeguarding public health and protecting personal data privacy, and provides the following guidance.

1. Can schools collect temperature measurements, travel histories and other health data of teachers, staff and students?

Collection of temperature measurements, travel histories and other health data of teachers, staff and students assists schools to assess the risk of transmission in schools and safeguard the health of teachers, staff and students. Hence, generally Moreover, under Data Protection Principle (DPP) 1(3)(b)(i) of Schedule 1 to the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (Cap. 486 of the Laws of Hong Kong, PDPO), on or before collecting personal data, schools shall take practicable steps (such as by way of notice) to provide teachers, staff, students and parents with the Personal Information Collection Statement (PICS), stating the kinds of personal data to be collected, the purposes of collection (such as safeguarding the health of teachers, staff and students), and the classes of persons (such as public health authorities) to whom the data may be transferred. It is also a good practice for schools to inform teachers, staff, students and parents of the retention period of the data in the PICS.

Can schools use personal data of teachers, staff and students for other purposes or disclose the data to other parties?

Personal data collected from teachers, staff and students by schools should only be used for the original purposes that the relevant parties were informed of (such as safeguarding the health of teachers, staff and students)

PCPD Provides Guidelines on Children's Privacy during the Pandemic

Under the principles of "classroom without boundaries" and "suspending classes without suspending learning", many schools have widely used various video conferencing software and online learning platforms to continue teaching, possibly resulting in collection of personal data of individuals. The Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data, Hong Kong (Privacy Commissioner), Mr Stephen Kai-yi WONG provides practical guidelines for schools and parents, reminding them of the potential risks of these software and online platforms, and the appropriate measures to protect the personal data of students and children.

The Privacy Commissioner said, "There are a wide variety of video conferencing software and online learning platforms with high-definition videotaping functionalities in the market. Apart from monitoring students' level of attention during lessons using attention-tracking function, teaching staff may also distribute and collect homework, score grades, etc. through online learning platforms. These online teaching tools can collect a vast amount of students' personal data. Without proper measures to handle those personal data, there would be increased risks of misuse or leakage of personal data. Hackers' attack and malicious use of data for illegal activities may result. These technologies, they should perform due diligence to ensure that technologies they select protect children's privacy, for instance, by ascertaining whether students' personal data would be collected by third parties, such as software developers and platform service providers. Vigilance is called for in the online world at al times to protect personal data privacy, just like what is needed in the real world. Once personal data is published online, it can be duplicated or permanently stored. In serious cases, it may even impact children's future lives as adults."

Privacy Commissioner's Office's Response to the Incident relating to the Film To My Nineteen-Year-Old Self

The Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) noted the media reports on the personal data privacy issues relating to the film To My Nineteen-Year-Old Self. The PCPD is concerned about the incident. In order to protect the personal data privacy of the relevant students (as data subjects), the PCPD has taken the initiative to contact the school concerned to ascertain the details of the incident.

Generally speaking, everyone's personal data privacy should be protected and respected, regardless of age. If any person or organisation intends to identify an individual or compile information about a specific individual through shooting a film, this may constitute collection of the personal data of the data subject, and the relevant individual or organisation (as data user) must comply with the requirements of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance and relevant Data Protection Principles (DPPs) when it collects, holds, processes or uses personal data.

With regard to the use of personal data, DPP3 provides that personal data shall not, without the voluntary and explicit consent of the data subject, be used (including the disclosure and transfer of relevant data) for a new purpose other than the purpose for which the data was to be used at the time of the collection of the data or a directly related purpose.

As of today (6 February), the PCPD has not received any complaints or enquiries from the public relating to the incident. Any person who suspects that his or her personal data privacy has been infringed and can provide prima facie evidence (including details about misuse of the personal data) may lodge a complaint with the PCPD.


